Pathways

college: diploma, certificate, degree programs, co-op **university**: general/Honours degree, concurrent degrees, co-op; grad degrees (Master's, PhD, etc.) apprenticeship: on-the-job training, many trades workplace: full or part-time work gap year: travel, volunteer, job shadow, upgrade, complete Dual Credits, make \$, "Discover Year"

How do I know which pathway is best for me?

- September/October Time to reflect, research and plan
- speak with trusted advisors (parents/guardians, teachers, etc.)
- consider the cost (tuition, housing, etc.)
- consider your resources (savings, scholarships, bursaries)

How do I know which pathway is best for me? (cont'd)

- consider your strengths and challenges; compare these to the various programs and opportunities available
- review program prereqs and admission avgs
- make sure you're on track to graduate
- review your *Graduation Summary* with your guidance counsellor

Graduation Requirements

- 30 credits (18 compulsory, 12 elective)
- 40 hours of community/volunteer hours Check West's website for ideas:

- literacy requirement (OSSL test or course)

Research... Why?

Look for programs and schools that will meet <u>your</u> learning needs.

- **IEPs are NOT automatically shared. <u>You</u> must share your learning needs and supporting info!**
- become familiar with the learning centres/supports at your desired institution (e.g. Paul Menton Centre at Carleton, CAL at Algonquin, etc.)
- Enriched Support Program (ESP/AESP) at Carleton
- articulation agreements between colleges and universities
- college to university pathways

Course Withdrawal Dates

Also known as *full disclosure/drop dates*, these dates are:

- Semester 1 November 22, 2024
- Semester 2 May 5, 2025

If you withdraw from a Grade 11 or 12 course after these "drop dates" the course will still be recorded on your Ontario Student Transcript (OST).

The Application Process

Focus: College

College: Important Date!

Apply to Ontario colleges by **February 1, 2025** because this is the "**equal consideration date**". You are strongly encouraged to apply well before this date.

Note: For out-of-province colleges check with the school, and then follow-up with Guidance.

(Transcripts often need to be ordered by you, and sent by us, to the school.)

General Admissions Requirements for College

Diploma/Certificate programs require:

• OSSD + ENG4C

Other requirements may include:

- specific courses
- a supplemental application or test (e.g., portfolio, audition, entrance exam, police check, HPAT (Health Program Admissions Test)

General Admissions Requirements for College (cont'd)

Degree programs at college require:

• OSSD + six (6) courses at the 4U/4M level + any other required courses (used to calculate average)

A supplemental application/form may be required (e.g., portfolio, audition, interview, personal statement of experience).

What do I need to apply to college?

- 1. An account that you set up at <u>www.ontariocolleges.ca</u>
- 2. A valid email address (not your school one, and one that you check regularly)
- 3. \$150 fee allows you to apply to five college programs, but no more than three programs at one college (several ways to pay)
- 4. Your OEN# (used to access your report card)

College - Key Dates

- November 1, 2024 earliest date that colleges may begin to send offers of admission
- February 1, 2025 deadline for equal consideration
- May 1, 2025 deadline for confirming/accepting offers of admission (unless offer is made after May 1)
- June 2025 the college will require tuition fees, deposits

College Application - Tips

- Once you've set up your account, record your application # and password in a safe place!
- If you're applying to a "highly competitive program", apply well before February 1 and:
 - verify the additional requirements, and ensure you complete them (e.g., a test, minimum grade, interview)
 - apply to a backup program (e.g., Pre-Health Sciences if applying to Nursing, etc.) just in case

- Don't leave this important process to the last minute!
- See your counsellor if you have questions. We are here to assist you with this important responsibility that <u>you</u> have for your future.

The Application Process

Focus: University

University: Important Date!

Apply to Ontario universities by **January 15, 2025**. This is an OUAC <u>deadline</u>.

Note: For out-of-province universities check with the school directly. (Deadlines may be different, and transcripts often need to be ordered by you, and sent by, us to the school.)

General Admissions Requirements for University

- OSSD + **six (6)** courses at the **4U/4M** level + any other required courses (will be used to calculate average)
 - Check each university and program (e.g. some unis/programs require 3 or 4 courses at the 4U level)
- A supplemental application/form may be required (e.g. portfolio, audition, interview, personal statement of experience)

What do I need to apply to university?

- An Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC) account. Go to <u>https://www.ouac.on.ca/</u> to set up your account in four easy steps (quick <u>how-to video</u>)
- 2. As a high school applicant, you'll choose the "undergraduate application";
- 3. Once your account is set-up, "My Undergraduate Hub" has everything you need to apply, pay fees, etc. Check out this <u>video</u>.
- 4. There are five main steps to apply. Take your time and read through each step with care. You'll need **your OEN #** (not to be confused with your student number) and you'll need to pay application fees (\$156 base fee covers three program choices; each additional choices is \$50; other fees may apply: <u>https://www.ouac.on.ca/guide/undergrad-fees/</u>

Note: For those with older siblings/family who have applied to uni, PIN numbers and application types (101 vs 105) are now obsolete.

A note about changes/charges...

- There is no fee for replacing a program choice with another program choice at the same university.
- If you amend your application to withdraw a program choice at 1 university and add a program choice at a different university, you will be charged \$50 for the new program choice.
- You may apply to as many Ontario universities as you wish; however, you are limited to a maximum of 3 program choices at any 1 university (including its affiliates). Some universities may further limit the number of programs you can apply to.

Uni applicants, remember...

... you'll receive an OUAC Reference Number once you've applied online. Record it and keep it in a safe place. You'll need this number + your password to:

- access your application
- respond to university offers of admission
- Tip: If you send correspondence to the uni, put this number on it so the document makes it to your file.

University - Key Dates

May 29, 2025 - the latest date by which you can expect a response (offer of admission, refusal) from an Ontario university. A few comments about offers:

- offers are conditional be sure to read and understand these conditions
- first round of offers occur in December/January, but
- most offers are made in the Spring

June 2, 2025 - the earliest date you may be required to respond to an Ontario university offer of admission <u>and</u> give a financial commitment (e.g., registration deposit, residence deposit, etc.).

Summer School

Check with the uni/college Admissions first about taking a Summer School course.

Students who take a Summer School course and have been given a conditional offer of admission **MUST** submit directly to the university:

(1) proof of registration in the Summer School course, and

(2) the final mark in August, prior to the university's deadline.

After applying...

- Check that your education history (courses and marks) in OCAS/OUAC is accurate!
- Check your OCAS/OUAC account regularly
- See Guidance if you:
 - think there are discrepancies w/ your education history
 - need to add courses (e.g., languages, private online courses)
- Check your spam/junk folder for college/uni emails
- Read emails, conditional offers, etc. with care
- Accept offers and pay tuition by the deadlines indicated

Post Secondary in the USA

- Visit the admissions site of the school that you want to apply to and find out how they want you to apply (apply directly or use a service like the <u>common</u> <u>app</u>)
- Find out if you need to do any standardized tests (SAT, ACT)
- Are you looking to play sports in the NCAA?
 - \rightarrow make sure you are <u>eligible</u>
 - → NCAA Eligibility Center



Funding Your Education



How much will it all cost?

- Average annual cost of college:
 - tuition \$2400 (avg.) plus ancillary fees + books and supplies + living expenses + meals + incidentals
 - <u>https://www.ontariocolleges.ca/en/colleges/paying-for-college</u>
- Average annual cost of university:
 - tuition \$9000 (avg.) plus ancillary fees + books and supplies + living expenses + meals + incidentals
 - <u>https://www.ontariouniversitiesinfo.ca/tuition-and-fees</u>

**These are estimates. Costs will vary depending on program, location, etc.

Sources of Funding

- Personal savings (family, your own, RESPs)
- Bursaries based on need, per institution
- Work-study programs, paid co-op
 - Some programs start in 1st year, most require application after 1st term
- Bank loans (eg student line of credit)
- Summer jobs
- This May, apply to West's commencement awards, some have award \$\$
- Scholarships... (next slide)

Scholarships

- entrance scholarships
 - based on marks (80%+ may be eligible) and come with offers of admission; see your desired schools' websites for details
- by application
 - uni/college-based: check your desired schools for the scholarships that they offer; check early!
 - external (eg businesses, banks, organizations, etc.) we post many scholarships on our Student Services website
 - check out *The Scholarship Report* (our website, Xello, GClassroom)
- consider joining: <u>www.scholartree.ca</u>, <u>www.scholarshipscanada.com</u>, etc.

Sources of Funding - OSAP

OSAP = Ontario Student Assistance Program

- a combo of loans and grants
- you can take the grant portion only
- Go to <u>www.ontario.ca/OSAP</u> early for helpful planning tools
- Read about and apply for OSAP early so your application is processed prior to tuition deadlines
