



Transition: Grade 8 to Grade 9

This transition is very important to us; we start the process almost a full year before students start their first day of grade 9:

- Grade 8 Orientation November/December
- Welcome to High School Information Night tonight!
- Feeder school visits/course selection late January
- Transition meetings/IPRCs for students with special learning needs - April/May









Transition: Grade 8 to Grade 9

- Welcome to the first day of grade 9 Link Crew Activities
- Link Crew activities will continue throughout first semester
- grade 9s will meet their guidance counselor in the first semester and if they have an IEP, their learning support teacher as well







What to Expect in GRADE 9

- Link Crew Activities: Grade 9 Dance, Club Fair, Mental Health Fair etc

- Extra-curricular activities: sports teams, clubs, intramurals etc

- Meeting new people
- More responsibility
- Developing learning skills:
 - Time management, organization
- Starting to focus on your future pathway











What to Expect in GRADE 9

- 8 classes per year
- 4 classes each semester
- 45 minutes for lunch

1 class = 1 credit

- 75 minute periods, fast pace ATTENDANCE is very important to ensure academic success, completing homework also key to success
- We are an early start school!

High School Graduation Requirements

For students who started Grade 9 on or after fall 2024

Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD)

Earned with the successful completion of:

- 30 high school credits (17 Compulsory + 13 Optional)
- 2 of the above credits earned through online learning courses (opt out available)
- 40 hours of Community Involvement Activities
- Provincial Literacy Requirement (OSSLT or OSSLC)
- Provincial Financial Literacy
 Requirement (part of the Grade 10
 Mathematics course)

This Diploma keeps all doors open

Ontario Secondary School Certificate (OSSC)

- Granted on request to students aged 18+ who leave school before fulfilling the requirements for the Ontario Secondary School Diploma
- Requires a minimum of 14 credits.
- This Certificate may be a useful means of recognizing achievement for students who may plan to take additional training, or who plan to find employment after leaving school.
- This Certificate does not lead to college or university.

Certificate of Accomplishment (COA)

- Students who leave school before fulfilling the requirements for the OSSD or the OSSC may be granted a Certificate of Accomplishment.
- There is no credit requirement.
- This Certificate may be a useful means of recognizing achievement for students who plan to take certain adaptive programs, or other kinds of additional training, or who plan to find employment after leaving school.
- This Certificate does not lead to college or university.










OSSD Graduation Requirements

30 Credits - 17 compulsory and 13 elective credits (2 "mandatory" elearning credits)

40 Hours of Community Service

Grade 10 Literacy Test and Financial Literacy Requirement









Community Service Hours

- Your child can start earning hours as soon as they have completed Grade 8
- Our website has many ideas for hours
- Community service hours must:
 - Be with a <u>not-for-profit organization</u> or a <u>charitable event</u>
 - benefit the whole community
 - not replace/displace a paid worker
 - Be outside of school time

Literacy Test/OSSLT

- It's written in your student's Grade 10 year in the semester they have English
- The date cannot be deferred. If your child misses it, they must wait until the next session to write it.











Financial Literacy Requirement

• Will be a part of the grade 10 math curriculum - more details to come

• Financial literacy learning will include:

- managing a household budget
- saving for a home
- learning to invest
- protecting themselves from financial fraud











Elearning credits

Although it is "mandatory" for students to complete 2 elearning credits as part of their OSSD, you can opt-out if this is in the best interest of your student.

This is 2 of the 30 credits - not an additional 2 credits.

French Immersion

- 10 of the 30 credits must be in French; this includes the French Immersion course in all 4 grades: FIF1D, FIF2D, FIF3U, FIF4U
- Most of the French credits are available in Grades 9 and 10 so that by the end of Grade 10, immersion students will already have 8 of the 10 required French credits
- If the 6th digit of a course code is F, the language of instruction is French ie. CGC1WF









Types of Courses in Grade 9 and 10

- Open Courses - all electives, ie. AMU10

"D" - Academic/Destreamed Course - ie. FSF1D or FIF1D

"W" - Destreamed Courses - ie. MTH1W, SNC1W, ENL1W, CGC1W

"L" for Locally Developed Courses - in math and English ie. MAT1L or ENG1L

Course Selection

Grade 8s will be choosing their courses through Course Planner in Xello. They will be working with their grade 8 teachers to complete this important task to be prepared for grade 9.

Course submission opens January 20 for grade 8s. We will choose a due date when we visit JDPS, Huntley and Stonecrest between Jan 27 - 29.

All the submissions need to be completed by Feb 28 when XELLO closes.









Pathway Connected Learning Experiences

Cooperative Education

Students who are at least 14 years old can earn credits while working in the community with community partners.

Dual Credit

Students in Grades 11 or 12 have an opportunity to attend college and explore career and postsecondary opportunities earning a college and a high school credit.

eLearning

Students have the opportunity to learn in an online asynchronous environment supporting the completing of their learning around their unique schedule.

Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)

Students who are at least 15 years old can earn co-op credits and gain apprenticeship training leading to a Certificate of Qualification with journeyperson in a skilled trade.

Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM)

Students can earn a SHSM designation on their OSSD by exploring career paths through a bundle of specific courses, certifications and connections with industry partners.

Trades and Technology

Students can learn through hands-on, experiential projects and explore interests in different areas of technology.









Continuing Education Programs

- Elementary Summer School: Literacy and Numeracy support for students finishing grades 6-8 and preparation for grade 9.
- Summer School Credit: A variety of grade 9 to 12 credit courses offered with some credit options for students finishing grade 8. Some COOP credit opportunities for Grade 11-12 students.
- International and Indigenous Language Credit Programs (Secondary): Language credit courses are available for Grade 9-12 students running from September to June. A variety of languages are available.
- Specialised Programs: For specific student groups during the school year and summer such as credit programs for Black Youth, 2SLGBTQ+ Youth, and English Language Learners.
- Night School Credit: Two sessions during the school year (Fall/Winter) offering a range of grade 11 and 12 courses.
- Literacy and Numeracy (non credit): Our Literacy and Numeracy Programs provide students in Grades 7 12 with a supervised opportunity to complete, review, practice and organize their work in order to help them achieve greater success at school.






Xello: The Course Selection Tool

Xello: From a student's perspective

Xello is an online tool that students can use to explore career options, build skills, and reflect on how learning connects with career and learning goals. It is also the tool used for course selection.

With Xello your child will:

- Build Self-knowledge: Define their interests, skills, preferences, and aspirations so they can explore the opportunities right for them.
- Explore Options: Learn about career possibilities and educational pathways by exploring rich, engaging content and lessons.
- Create a Plan: Students can create dynamic actionable plans that outline the steps needed to achieve school, career, and life goals.
- Learn & Reassess: Interactive lessons help your child develop age appropriate skills and knowledge for success in school and beyond.
